Disparities in Breast Cancer Outcomes for Racial and Minority Groups

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Breast cancer is the most common type of cancer diagnosed and the second leading cause of cancer death in African American women in the United States.

African American women are about 40% more likely to die of breast cancer than Caucasian women.





African American women are more likely to be diagnosed at younger ages

African American women are more likely to be diagnosed at later stages with poorer outcomes

Triple-negative breast cancer occurs in African American women twice the rate of Caucasian women



Breast cancer is the **leading cause of cancer death** in **Hispanic & Latina** women in the US.

Breast cancer is often **diagnosed at later stages** in Hispanic & Latina women more than Caucasian women.



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While men can be diagnosed with **breast cancer** it is significantly **more common** in **women**.

Of men who have breast cancer, 1 in 5 have a 1st degree relative (mother, father, sister, brother) in his family that has been diagnosed with breast cancer.

These men may have a BRCA gene mutation.



Together there are ways we can **address barriers**, so **everyone** has the opportunity of **prevention**, **early diagnosis** and **treatment** of breast cancer.
